





HOUSING

Privatized Housing

At Davis-Monthan, military family housing is privatized. Actus Lend Lease/Soaring Heights Communities owns the family housing and is responsible for maintaining, repairing, constructing and managing the community. In addition to your option to purchase and rent housing in the local community, you now may choose to live in privatized housing by signing a tenant lease agreement with Soaring Heights Communities.

Unaccompanied Housing

UH is provided for unaccompanied Airmen in the ranks of E-1 to E-3 and E-4 with less than 3 years of service. Each Airman is provided a private sleeping room, furnishings, bed linens and supplies required for comfortable living. (Room arrangements may vary depending on location)

Unaccompanied Airmen in the rank of E-4 with greater than 3 years of service and above will move into housing in the local community.

Housing in the Local Community

The Military Housing Office (MHO) provides all DoD personnel with personalized services to assist in locating suitable housing in the local community. Although moving is sometimes stressful, it can also be an exciting opportunity to live off base and experience a new location. The MHO will assist you every step of the way to help you find your new home in the local community.

Contact the MHO as soon as you know you are moving. The government housing team will provide you the latest information on the local housing situation, and offer complete referral services and relocation assistance to make sure you find a quality place to live.

Support services range from helping members understand their lease agreements, providing information concerning the use of the military clause, and assisting in resident and landlord dispute resolution are among many of the MHO services provided.

The MHO partners with landlords, realtors, and property managers to make sure you receive the most current information about the local housing market. The MHO also monitors housing units offered for rent to the military community.

Tucson, located in Pima County, has a rental market that draws in new people on a regular basis since it is a low-cost area that has a wide variety of houses, condominiums, and apartments available for rent. The median home price in Tucson is approximately \$280,000-\$375,000. The average monthly rent for a two bedroom is \$900-\$1300, a three bedroom is \$1400-\$2000, and a four bedroom is \$1700-\$2400. Blessed with the natural beauty of the Sonoran Desert, and an unsurpassed climate of 350 sunny days a year. Residents here enjoy a high quality of life, and maintain the friendly, caring, atmosphere of a small town.

1. Where can I find an application for housing?

If you desire to reside in government-owned or privatized housing, please log into the Housing Early Assistance Tool (HEAT) website. This website can be accessed by logging on to the AF Housing Website at https://www.housing.af.mil or on the HOMES.mil website at https://www.homes.mil and click on the "HEAT" Logo after you select the installation of your choice on these sites. HEAT creates an easy on-line experience that will connect you with the Military Housing Office (MHO) prior to your PCS transfer. HEAT also allows you to agree to release your personal information, to include contact information, to the Privatization Project Owner (Privatized Partner) at bases with privatized family housing, so they can provide you with information directly. Once you agree, the MHO will send the Privatized Housing Management Office (PMO) your information.

2. What housing allowances am I eligible for?

Military members are entitled to various allowances to ensure the transition to a new location is as smooth and stress free as possible.

If you have any questions, contact the local Housing Management Office.

3. How do I pay rent in privatized housing?

Similar to living in the local community, you will sign a tenant lease agreement, typically for a one-year term. Your lease includes a military clause and a lease termination clause. You pay your monthly rent by authorizing an allotment of your BAH that is paid directly to the Property Manager. If your move occurs prior to the allotment start date, then you will need to pay the pro-rated rent directly to the Property Manager. The Tenant Lease Agreement spells out all relevant rent payment terms and conditions. For more information about privatized housing, contact the local Military Housing Office.

4. Does rent in privatized housing include utilities?

As of February 2023, on-base housing/Soaring Heights Communities has suspended the DOD mandated Utility Allowance (UA) program. As all standard utilities (water, sewer, trash, and electric) are currently included in the rental rate/lease agreement.

Once the UA program has been reinstated, Soaring Heights Communities will then take the necessary steps to inform all current, and future tenants regarding the revisions and standards pertaining to the policies and procedures of the program.

The intent of the UA Program is to heighten awareness and promote energy conservation. Through it Soaring Heights residents can become good stewards of our environment. If you have any questions, please call the Soaring Heights Welcome Home Center at: 520-745-5024.

It is the responsibility of the parent or legal guardian to transport the student to and from school if registered through open enrollment.

PRIVATE SCHOOL are a choice for parents and there are school tuition organizations (STO's) that can assist with scholarships. 

AF Spouse Reimbursement for Re-licensure/Re-certification and/or Small Business Costs FAO's

Who is eligible for this program?

The 2018 NDAA allows the AF to reimburse service members up to \$1K for spouse's re-licensure, recertification & business costs resulting from PCS moves that cross U.S. state lines, including OCONUS to stateside moves.

What is the eligibility criteria for a qualifying PCS or PCA?

The following criteria must be met to be considered a qualifying PCS/PCA:

- The Sponsor's PCS/PCA authenticated orders must authorize movement of the Sponsor's dependents at the government's expense.
- The Sponsor is reassigned from a previous duty station to a location where the spouse must:
 - *Secure a license or certification for the <u>same occupation</u> in a different location with different licensing authority and requirements
 - *Dismantle and re-establish a small business at the new location
- Qualifying relicensing costs must be incurred and paid after the date the member's PCS/PCA orders are authenticated and within 24 months of the date the member's PCS/PCA orders are authenticated.

Which licenses/certifications qualify for this program?

License/certification requirements vary by state; however, some examples include but are not limited to teaching, cosmetology, real estate, or nursing. What is a "qualified" cost?

Licensure/Certification: Exams and registration fees imposed by the new duty station to secure a license or certification to engage in the same profession in which the spouse engaged while in the previous duty station.

Small business: Registration fees, permit fees, moving services for equipment, equipment removal, new equipment purchases, information technology expenses, and inspection fees. *PCS/PCA orders must be authenticated on/or after 23 Dec 22 to qualify for the reimbursement of a Small Business relocation.

How do I apply for reimbursement?

The military sponsor must submit to their Unit Resource Advisor (RA) or Budget Analyst:

- Copy of PCS orders
- Copy of spouse's previous state license or certification
- Proof of fee payment showing the new state's re-licensure fees
- Optional Form 1164, Claim for Reimbursement for Expenditures *M&FRC can provide template

The unit RA/Budget Analyst will review package for accuracy then submit to their Group Budget Analyst for submission to CPTS. CPTS will then submit to DFAS for reimbursement.

** The payment requires the military sponsor's signature for the request of reimbursement; the military member must be the one to submit the claim. Contact your unit Resource Advisor/Budget Analyst or submit an inquiry to the 355 CPTS via CPS Portal for questions regarding reimbursement. Reimbursement is up to \$1K.

General Information

This office handles all DEERS updates, and issues Common Access Cards (CACs) and dependent and retiree ID cards. We are open for appointments and walk-ins. Customers with confirmed appointments are seen before all walk-in customers, who are then seen in order of sign in. The DEERS Support Office @ 1-800-538-9552 can also verify statuses and change/update DEERS information.

For a new spouse – the marriage certificate, current driver's license or other current photo ID (i.e. CAC /USID /State ID /Current Passport). Secondary forms of ID may be Social Security card, Birth Certificate, Voter Registration Card, VA Membership ID Card, or any ID card issued by a federal, state, or local government entity. The sponsor will have a grace period of 90 days to provide the new married name social security card to any DEERS office for scanning into documentation records. If the other forms of ID have not been updated to reflect the new name when the USID is due for renewal, SSM's and VO's must reissue the dependent spouse USID Card to match the two forms of ID that are provided at the time of USID renewal.

NOTE: If the sponsor is not present for initial enrollment, the spouse MUST HAVE a current Power of Attorney in order to enroll themselves into DEERS. 2. If a sponsor needs to enroll a spouse who is not present for initial processing, the sponsor must have either (all) original documents OR certified copies of original (aforementioned) documents.

For a newborn child – the birth certificate or hospital proof/confirmation of birth letter, and social security card is needed. If no social security card has been issued at the time of enrollment, a temporary ID number will be generated for the child in RAPIDS. The sponsor will have 90 days to provide the actual social security card to any DEERS office. Failure to do so will result in a Direct Care suspension through TRICARE.

For a Step-Child - sponsor must bring the marriage certificate, step-child's birth certificate, and step-child's social security card.

Adopted Child – sponsor must bring adoption decree, revised birth certificate and revised social security card to reflect change in surname of adopted child.

Secondary Dependency – sponsor must make application for secondary dependency through the DFAS website; RE. Adding a parent, Parent in Law, Legal Ward or incapacitated (adult) Child to DEERS. Ask your DEERS/RAPIDS technician for more information.

Divorce – the divorce decree is needed to remove a former spouse from the sponsors DEERS family profile. NOTE: Step-child(ren) relationship to the sponsor will also be terminated with this transaction.

Desert Dangers

Whether you are New to the area or have live here for years it is always recommended to be educated and aware of the dangers that our unique desert environment brings.

<u>VALLEY FEVER-</u> Coccidiomycosis, or Valley Fever, is a disease caused by a fungus which exists as a mold found in the soil of the Sonoran Desert. The disease can affect most species of domestic animals, exotic animals and even people. It is not considered contagious from one animal to another or from animals to human. The disease occurs as a result of the inhalation of fungal spores directly from soil or from dust in the air. Valley Fever can affect nearly every system in the body and can have symptoms ranging from a mild cough, to limping and neurological signs. Early stages of the disease usually start out with listlessness, anorexia or loss of appetite and fever. A blood test sent for analysis at a laboratory can determine if your pet has been exposed to Valley Fever. Treatment of the disease consists of anti-fungal medications and other supportive care. Some dogs cannot be "cured" of Valley Fever, but often the disease can be controlled with medications.

<u>SNAKES</u>- Many species of snakes call the Sonoran Desert their home, and while not all snakes are dangerous and poisonous, they should all be avoided whenever possible. Rattlesnakes are notably the most dangerous snake in the Southwest. Rattlesnake bites are a serious and life threatening emergency for any pet or person who is unlucky enough to get bit. Pets should be rushed to the nearest emergency clinic for treatment. Treatment often involves anti-venom injections, intravenous fluids, high doses of antibiotics, and generalized supportive care with pain control. Recovery from snake bites is a long and drawn out process and unfortunately some pets do not recover. Prevention of snake bites is the best policy. Avoid all snakes whenever possible and keep yards free of



debris. Also consider enrolling your pet in a snake avoidance class to train your pet to stay far away from these poisonous creatures.



COLORADO RIVER TOADS- Colorado River Toads are small toads that appear during the monsoon season in the Southwest. These toads secrete their toxin through pores in the skin when they feel threatened. Pets that pick up a toad and get the toxin in their mouth suffer from neurological problems that if not treated can cause death. If your pet disturbs a Colorado River Toad, call an emergency veterinarian immediately for instructions. Again, prevention in the best policy. Remove all toads from your yard before letting pets out, do not leave water bowls or standing water unattended for your pet to drink from, try to keep water bowls indoors,

and keep places where your pets reside free of debris.

Desert Dangers cont...



<u>COYOTES-</u> Coyotes have become so used to people that they are often seen in suburban neighborhoods. They will prey on small domestic animals such as cats and small to medium sized dogs. Coyotes also carry mange, which is a mite infection in the skin that can be transmitted to other animals and in some cases even to people. <u>Do not</u> leave small pets outside unsupervised especially in the early morning and late evenings. Discourage coyotes from roaming your neighborhood by not leaving food out for them or other animals and by keeping

garbage securely contained. Should your pet come in contact with a coyote and become injured, immediately call an emergency veterinarian for instructions and care.

TICK FEVER- Tick Fever, or Ehrlichia Canis, is a tick transmitted disease affecting dogs. The brown dog tick carries the organism causing Ehrlichiosis and transmits the disease while feeding on the dog's blood. The best prevention of the disease is to prevent ticks. This should include checking your dog's skin daily for ticks, and using tick treatments such as Advantix. Tick Fever can be initially diagnosed with a simple blood test that is run in conjunction with our Heartworm & Lyme test. Symptoms of tick fever can range from mild lethargy and fever, to not wanting to eat and nose bleeds. Treatment is normally involves a course of antibiotics and possibly other supportive care.

<u>JAVELINA</u>- Javelina are wild pigs that roam the Southwest. They do not see well and are easily startled. Javelina mothers are very protective of their young and will often defend them aggressively. Even though Javelinas are "just pigs" they can cause quite a bit of damage when they attack. Dogs should not be allowed to torment or chase javelina, regardless of their size. If you should come across javelina at any point, leave them alone and go as far away from them as possible.

<u>Valley Fever-</u> Valley Fever is cause by a fungus that grows in our soil about 12-18 inches down. Coccidiodes (cocci, for short) likes warm dry climates such as those found in southern and central Arizona, Southern California and SW New Mexico. When it rains, spores multiply. Spores from the fungus can be thrown into the air by construction, farming, digging, yard word and travel by wind, which then are inhaled by you or your pet. In animals symptoms are coughing, lethargy, lameness, fever, weightless, back or neck pain, etc.

<u>Rabies</u>- Rabies is a preventable viral disease most often transmitted through the bite of a rabid animal. Rabies is fatal once symptoms, the virus attacks the central nervous system causing, encephalitis. Common symptoms are anxiety, drooling, personality changes, delirium. Bats, skunks and foxes are the primary culprits that transmit the disease in Arizona.

AZ Vehicle Emissions & the Employee Certification and Reporting System (ECARS)

All personnel who drive on DMAFB 60 days a year or greater MUST comply with local vehicle emission testing regardless of where vehicles are registered/licensed.

Federal Law -The Clean Air Act as amended in 1990 Title 1 Part A Section 118(d)

(d) VEHICLES OPERATED ON FEDERAL INSTALLATIONS.—Each department, agency, and instrumentality of executive, legislative, and judicial branches of the Federal Government having jurisdiction over any property or facility shall require all employees which operate motor vehicles on the property or facility to furnish proof of compliance with the applicable requirements of any vehicle inspection and maintenance program established under the provisions of subpart 2 of part D or subpart 3 of part D for the State in which such property or facility is located (without regard to whether such vehicles are registered in the State). The installation shall use one of the following methods to establish proof of compliance—

(1) presentation by the vehicle owner of a valid certificate of compliance from the vehicle inspection & maintenance program;
(2) presentation by the vehicle owner of proof of vehicle registration within the geographic area covered by the vehicle inspection and maintenance program (except for any program whose enforcement mechanism is not through the denial of vehicle registration);
(3) another method approved by the vehicle inspection and maintenance program administrator.
[42 U.S.C. 7418]

Military members are not granted relief from emissions testing through the soldiers and sailors relief act and the government is not allowed to use funds to pay for testing or repairs of vehicles due to this law.

Exempted Vehicles

- Most model year 2010 or newer, except reconstructed, vehicles (only for first 5 years of vehicle life)
- Most model year 2012 or newer original equipment alternative fuel vehicles
- Model year 1966 and older vehicles
- Vehicles designated as "collectible" (requires collectible vehicle insurance, reported to Arizona Motor Vehicle Division by insurer)
- Electric powered, golf carts or vehicles with engine displacement of less than 90cc
- Motorcycles
- Apportioned vehicles (licensed in more than one state) **This does not apply to military with vehicles licensed out of state.** This is for commercial vehicles that pay registration to more than one state
- Vehicles leased to a person residing outside the emission control areas
- Vehicles transferred between dealers (wholesale)

Good to Know Definitions

Parking on the facility - parking an employee vehicle on a parking area owned, leased or under the control of the Federal facility to which the employee is primarily assigned.

Primarily assigned - Primarily assigned - the Federal facility at which an employee is principally employed. The term "primarily assigned" does not include personnel on temporary assignment or duty for 180 days or less; nor students temporarily assigned to the facility solely for training. **Primarily operated -** the area in which the vehicle is garaged or driven in excess of 50% of its annual mileage. **Contact Ms. Leah Profftt at 228-4885 or leah.proffitt@us.af.mil for more information**

ARIZONA HISTORY FACTS

- 1. Arizona has 3,928 mountain peaks and summits, more mountains than any one of the other Mountain States (Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming).
- 2. All New England, plus the state of Pennsylvania would fit inside Arizona.
- 3. Arizona became the 48th state and last of the contiguous states on February 14, 1912.
- 4. Arizona's disparate climate can yield both the highest temperature across the nation and the lowest temperature across the nation in the same day.
- 5. There are more wilderness areas in Arizona than in the entire Midwest. Arizona alone has 90 wilderness areas, while the Midwest has 50.
- 6. Arizona has 26 peaks that are more than 10,000 feet in elevation.
- 7. Out of all the states in the U.S., Arizona has the largest percentage of its land designated as Indian lands.
- 8. The Five C's of Arizona's economy are: Cattle, Copper, Citrus, Cotton, and Climate.
- 9. More copper is mined in Arizona than all the other states combined, and the Morenci Mine is the largest copper producer in all of North America.
- 10 Clark Gable and Carole Lombard, two of the most prominent movie stars of Hollywood's Golden Age, were married on March 18, 1939, in Kingman, Arizona.
- 11. The world's largest solar telescope is located at Kitt Peak National Observatory in Sells, Arizona.
- 12. Bisbee, Arizona is known as the Queen of the Copper Mines because during its mining heyday it produced nearly 25 percent of the world's copper and was the largest city in the Southwest between Saint Louis and San Francisco.
- 13. Billy the Kid killed his first man, Windy Cahill, in Bonita, Arizona.
- 14. Arizona grows enough cotton each year to make more than one pair of jeans for every person in the United States.
- 15. Famous labor leader and activist Cesar Chavez was born in Yuma.
- 16. Mount Lemmon, Tucson, in the Santa Catalina Mountains, is the southernmost ski resort in the United States.
- 17. If you cut down a protected species of cactus in Arizona, you could spend more than a year in prison.
- 18. The only place in the country where mail is delivered by mule is the village of Supai, located at the bottom of the Grand Canyon.
- 19. Located on Arizona's western border, Parker Dam is the deepest dam in the world at 320 feet.
- 20. Oraibi, a Hopi village located in Navajo County, Arizona, dates back to before A.D. 1200 and is reputed to be the oldest continuously inhabited community in America.
- 21. Rainfall averages for Arizona range from less than three inches in the deserts to more than 30 inches per vear in the mountains.

- 22. Roadrunners are not just in cartoons! In Arizona, you'll see them running up to 17-mph away from their enemies.
- 23. The Saguaro cactus is the largest cactus found in the U.S. It can grow as high as a five-story building and is native to the Sonoran Desert, which stretches across southern Arizona.
- 24. Sandra Day O'Connor, the first woman appointed to the U.S. Supreme Court, grew up on a large family ranch near Duncan, Arizona.
- 25. The best-preserved meteor crater in the world is located near Winslow, Arizona.
- 26. The average state elevation is 4,000 feet.
- 27. You could pile four 1,300-foot skyscrapers on top of each other and they still would not reach the rim of the Grand Canyon.
- 28. The hottest temperature recorded in Arizona was 128 degrees at Lake Havasu City on June 29, 1994
- 29. The coldest temperature recorded in Arizona was 40 degrees below zero at Hawley Lake on January 7, 1971.
- 30. A saguaro cactus can store up to nine tons of water.
- 31. The state of Massachusetts could fit inside Maricopa County (9,922 sq. miles).
- 32. Wyatt Earp was neither the town marshal nor the sheriff in Tombstone at the time of the shoot-out at the O..K. Corral. His brother Virgil was the town marshal.
- 33. On June 6, 1936, the first barrel of tequila produced in the United States rolled off the production line in Nogales, Arizona.
- 34. The Sonoran Desert is the most biologically diverse desert in North America.
- 35. The two largest man-made lakes in the U.S. are Lake Mead and Lake Powell, both located in Arizona.
- 36. The longest remaining intact section of Route 66 can be found in Arizona and runs from Seligman to Topock, a total of 157 unbroken miles.
- 37. Prescott, Arizona is home to the world's oldest rodeo, and Payson, Arizona is home to the world's oldest continuous rodeo, both of which date back to the 1880's.
- 38. Kartchner Caverns, near Benson, Arizona, is a massive limestone cave with 13,000 feet of passages, two rooms as long as football fields, and one of the world's longest soda straw stalactites: measuring 21 feet 3 inches.
- 39. You can carry a loaded firearm on your person, no permit required (concealed carry permit still *recommended* though....

- 1. The Tucson Rodeo Parade is the largest non-motorized parade in the world.
- 2. With 350 days of sunshine a year, Tucson is literally the sunniest city in the United States.
- 3. American Quarter Horse Racing as we know it in the United States began at Rillito Downs in the 1940s.
- 4. The University of Arizona allowed female students to study medicine in the 1890s, long before it was common practice to do so.
- 5. The Arizona State Museum on the University of Arizona Campus is home to the world's largest and most well-documented collection of Southwest Indian pottery.
- 6. Tucson is the northernmost point on the globe where you can find a jaquar.
- 7. One of Tucson's favorite day hikes, Tumamoc Hill, is actually home to one of the earliest examples of native agricultural known to man and still functions as an active archaeological dig site today.
- 8. The name "Tucson" comes from the name given to Sentinel Peak ("A" Mountain) by the O'odham Tribe, Ts-iuk-shan, which basically meant that it had a base darker than its top.
- 9. "A" Mountain was said by Spanish settlers and O'odham people to be used as a lookout point by Apache raiders, hence the modern name "Sentinel Peak."
- 10. The Arizona-Sonora Museum was rated one of **America's top zoos** in the country by Parade Magazine.
- 11. Pima Air & Space Museum is the largest privately funded air museum in the world.
- 12. The city ranks #2 on a list of the Top 10 Most Misspelled City Names.
- 13. The city is known as a mecca for the arts. Ansel Adams founded the UA's Center for Creative Photography and has original prints hanging there.
- 14. Arizona is known as the Valentine State. We entered the union on February 14, 1912.
- 15. University of Arizona was founded in 1885 before Arizona was a state
- 16. Before U of A student body president and revered football quarterback John "Button" Salmon died in 1926, his last words to his teammates were "Tell them ... tell the team to bear down." This is where U of A's "Bear Down" motto stems from.
- 17. Colossal Cave is one of the largest dry caverns in the world. Explorers have yet to find its end.
- 18. Bicycle friendly: 630 miles of striped bike paths
